## **Daniel Rosenbaum on the subject of Container Gardens**



Our Guest Speaker at our August Get-together was Daniel Rosenbaum who entertained us with his path to his current passion.

Incorporating Product Design and Ceramics, his interest in photography mostly of plants, flowers and finding abstract forms in nature and rocks, he started constructing planter boxes from various materials. He realized that he needed to propagate plants particularly succulents to fill them as well as seeing the importance of connecting humans with nature and the greening of cities. Daniel studied Horticulture and has now opened a nursery and runs Botanic Art / potting classes as well as garden and landscape design at The Container Pot Workshop.

Many of us took advantage of the succulents Daniel had there for sale.

# Our August and September Working Bees:

A surprisingly hot Saturday in August saw us break into two teams tackling the perennial border and beds alongside the pathways adjacent to the bowling club. First we weeded and prepared the soil for planting. What was planted? Three Jane McGrath Rose bushes (attractive old English style rose), *Gazania* (daisy-like flower heads in brilliant shades of yellow and orange) and *Cineraria* (a velvety-soft lacy silver foliage plant). The Wednesday bee was cancelled due to torrential rain.



Our two September Bees were focused on freshening up our Garden in preparation for our October Spring Festival.

There were very few gardeners on both days, but a mammoth effort as we planted a huge range of soft-wooded perennials, herbs and flowering plants around the Garden and in the Sensory Garden – over 100 just on the Saturday!



The list of what we planted: *Brachyscome* "Mauve Delight", *Calamagrostis* "Karl Foester", *Doodia aspera* (Rasp Fern), *elichrysum angustifolia* (curry plant), *Liriope muscari variety*, *Myoporum parvifolium* "Purpurea", *Osmanthus diosmifolia* "Red Gingham", *Pelargonium inodorum* (native Pelargonium), *Pelargonium sp unknown* (with coral flowers), *Plectranthus argentatus*, *Prostanthera rotundifolia*, *Stromanthe* "Tricolor", *Salvia* "Compact Blue", *Viola heder*acea, *Westringia fruticose* "Zena" (native Rosemary), Oregano, yellow Petunias, Purple Basil, Thai Basil, Thyme, and Vietnamese Mint.



**Safety update:** Railings were finally installed on the stone stairs from the Garden down to the bowling club car park.

Guided Garden Tour for War Vets Gardening Group: We hosted a lively group from the War Vets gardening group for a tour around the Garden.




#### Ruth Hansen with an introduction to Permaculture

At our October Get-together, Guest Speaker Ruth Hansen, the Coordinator of Permaculture Northern Beaches (PNB), presented a large group with a fascinating look at how Permaculture works with nature to create healthy environments and how we can participate here on the Northern Beaches.

Afterwards he roamed around the festival speaking to people and also joined our plant stall with Sandy, giving great advice to potential buyers.







Some members (alongside a few family members) and executive committee manned our stalls, from sizzling sausages, selling plants and raffle tickets, not to mention handling the very important EFTPOS transactions, guiding historic and botanic tours and welcoming visitors.



Even more members worked tirelessly entertaining our smaller visitors in the kid's zone that was located in the grassy area of the sensory garden next to the playground where we scattered picnic blankets.



And there was plenty to entertain them: a treasure hunt through the garden with fun prizes at the end, potting a nasturium seed to take home, creating mini masterpieces and the ever popular face painter, plus loads of games like darts, quoits, shuttlecock and and building blocks.
