DA approved for the demolition of existing child care centre building

The Development Application for the demolition of the existing redundant child care centre building and the installation of landscaping has been approved!

The demolition of the childcare centre building looks like it will take place during the first quarter of 2023 (weather permitting!). The area, initially, will be turfed with grass so that the drainage issues are addressed before the future planned landscaping can begin. This will involve creating a versatile area of open space that can accommodate events.

Also approved was the landscaping, installing of interpretative signage, seating, lighting, and interpretative paving in the north-western corner of Ivanhoe Park that historically formed part of the Ivanhoe Loop (former tram track). This is scheduled for a later date after the open space area is finished.

This is all thanks to the efforts of our members, residents and of course, the Northern Beaches Council to seek to enhance the heritage values of the Garden while providing much needed public open space.

• Work on sandstone bridge and pathways - completed

It may have taken a while because of the inclement weather but the reconstruction of the sandstone bridge and the pathways leading to and from it have been completed.



• Tree and Vegetation Management Plan ongoing

Planting plants from the Vegetation Management Plan is progressing during our Working Bees, in fact, we have started a test project under the Bunya. It's a large, barren and rather ugly area where nothing seems to thrive so we're experimenting with *Hedera heliix* or common ivy. This evergreen plant thrives in shady areas, in forest clearings as well as on cliffs and slopes where the soil is fertile and moist. It seemed ideal to plant it here because it stays green all year and makes an attractive ground cover. This area has a defined border so if successful we can easily manage and ensure that the ivy does not spread to other parts of the garden.

The Tree of the Month Project – a tree immortalised in song



A popular pastime during the summer months is catching colourful floral displays from, no not the Jacaranda, but one of our natives – the Illawarra Flame Tree. Its brilliant scarlet bell-shaped flowers grow in clusters at the end of the branches so the entire tree in enrobed usually after the leaves have dropped. A spectacular sight that even inspired a song by Cold Chisel called *Flame Trees*.

Flame Tree

Brachychiton acerifolius

From Greek: *brachys* –short, and *chiton* – a tunic, a reference to the coating on the seed; *acerifolius* having foliage like the genus *Acer* (maple)

Also known as: Illawarra Flame tree, flame tree, lacebark tree, kurrajong



The large seeds are rich in protein and taste like peanut. Indigenous Australians ate them either raw or roasted after removing the irritating hairs that surround them in the pod. They are nutritious, containing 18% protein and 25% fat with high levels of zinc and magnesium.
